The weather was fantastic again today, and the digging was spectacular. We spent a good bit of time "primping" our massive EBA city wall for photos, which was quite a project. But she shined up very well like the "cover girl" she might become at some point in the future. The level of preservation of the construction phases, even of the visible methods of construction, is pretty amazing. If you've never gotten a sense of the size of Tall el-Hammam/Sodom, get a load of the attached photos. This is just a 6-meter sliver of a fortification system that also includes walls from 5-8m thick, towers, glacis, gates, curtain walls, entrance plazas, ramparts, and rings the entire site for a distance of between 2.5 and 3 kilometers. While today we're just looking at the stone foundations and a few courses of the mudbrick superstructures, the walls once rose to a height of 15 to 20 meters (45-60 ft.), were likely crenellated, and had towers rising even higher every 20 meters or so along the entire perimeter. This was the most important and powerful city in the southern Levant during the Bronze Age.
