Hello All:

With fatigue and a couple of bugs going around, we were pretty thin going out to the site today. There are about 15 of us left, and I think 4 stayed back today for one reason or other.

But we did a tremendous amount of physical work trimming balks and installing nearly a thousand sandbags around our squares, balks, and on our vulnerable walls. Our Jordan DoA staff guys were pretty amazed at how good it looked, as this was the first time this has ever been done at a dig in Jordan. It's pretty common on the other side of the river, but evidently they've never seen the need to do it here. It's a great way to protect your excavation from erosion, and it stabilizes otherwise weak balk edges against collapse.

Tomorrow Mike will take photos from his tower, and they should look great. We've also got a lot more cleaning and balk trimming to do tomorrow before photos. Today was the coldest day we've had (still no real need for a jacket), but tomorrow is supposed to be sunny and much warmer.

Right now we're just taking one day at a time, as we're simply running out of energy after so many tough weeks in the field. It does wear on you. I'm trying not to think about either red or green chile, and to stay focused on the tasks at hand. Personally, I've only missed one day due to a little intestinal thing, but I am getting pretty tired due to the fact that I haven't taken a day off in almost 8 weeks. Even on days off I've always got paperwork, writing, or some kind of analysis to do, and usually put in a full day no matter what. But that's why I'm here, so no complaints! I greatly appreciate your prayers for God's sustaining grace. But when I think of those suffering in Haiti, I know that any problems we've got are minuscule!
