

# CHALLENGING QUESTIONS PEOPLE ASK

Lesson 3 w/ Answers

The Security of the Believer

We continue our study, "Challenging Questions People Ask." This lesson's question is one that I always look forward to addressing, as I'm sure that it's something many of us may have one-time wondered, or even asked. This question is, "Can I lose my salvation?" It is a question that I have been asked many times, and normally the person asking it is a new, or relatively new, Christian.

The impetus for this question follows this logic: Once we accept Christ—and come to know and appreciate the priceless gift of eternal life and what it is like living in God's presence with Christ as our Shepherd—we also realize that it's something that we *never* want to lose.

I believe that in our early days of growing in Christ, the concept of "once saved, always saved" can be adversely affected—either by the behavior of people whom we hold in high esteem (as "mature" Christians) or even by our own behavior (when that behavior runs counter to God's will). It is almost impossible to quantify the impact on a new believer's life when a respected Christian does something, or behaves in a way, that is clearly not Christian. As well, we ourselves begin to doubt our own salvation when we discover that we are still sinners and continue to sin in ways that are displeasing to God. Both of these circumstances cause us to doubt our salvation, and/or that of others.

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***So now let's take a look at this question, "Can I lose my salvation?" and see how God's Word speaks to us about our salvation, and if there is something or some things, that we can do that would cause us to lose our gift of eternal life with Christ.***

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1. Let's first consider the motivation behind the question. That is, what would make someone even ask the question? What would make you believe that a person could lose their salvation?
  - a. ANSWER 1: In many cases, one of the fundamental drivers behind the question is when the adverse behavior of someone whom we regard as a "Christian" causes us to wonder if that person can still be saved after doing something or saying something like that.
  - b. ANSWER 2: In other cases, the motivation behind the question is based on our own doubt about ourselves. When elements of man's sinful nature manifest themselves in our behavior, we begin to wonder how we can possibly be saved. Or we begin believing that there are levels of sin, i.e., that some sins are greater or lesser than others, and that if we commit what we believe is a "great sin" against God, then we must have either (1) lost our salvation or (2) we were never saved in the first place.
2. Now suppose for a moment that the question of losing one's salvation is being asked because someone doubts that they are actually saved. Perhaps, for whatever reason, they do not feel worthy; or maybe the new life in Christ isn't what they imagined it to be. In these scenarios, even though they have accepted Christ and repented of their sins, they are still unsure whether they are really saved. After all it must take more than a confession of sin and God's great grace to save them. Read 1 John 5:13 and note what it specifically tells us regarding this frame of mind?
  - a. ANSWER: God's Word is in fact written so that we may KNOW that we are saved. It is a certainty; we can base it completely on God's faithfulness and His written Word, the Holy Bible.
3. Now consider John 3:16—the oft-quoted verse on salvation. What does it say about those who believe? Does it say that only those who believe in a certain way, or come from a certain walk, or have a certain experience can be saved? Who does it say is saved, for how long are they saved, and who saved them?
  - a. ANSWER 1: "Whosoever believes" shall be saved, i.e., all who believe are saved.
  - b. ANSWER 2: Salvation = eternal life. The believer is saved for eternity.
  - c. ANSWER 3: God does the saving. Nothing we do beyond repenting of our sins brings our salvation—only God and faith that Jesus is the one-and-only Son of God who came to die on a cross for us.

4. It is important to note this far into our study that there is nothing beyond repentance and believing on Jesus as the Christ that saves us. No act or religious practice (e.g., fasting, etc.) results in us being saved—only God’s great love for us and Jesus’ divine sacrifice for us. Now consider specific examples of acts or deeds that you would consider grounds for someone losing their salvation. List them.
  - a. ANSWER: Typically, here people will list things like murder, stealing, being dishonest, lying, cheating, or causing another believer to stumble as reasons that a person could lose their salvation. Suicide is another typical response. None are true.
5. Assume for a moment that when you answered question 4 above, you listed murder as a reason that a believer would lose their salvation, or perhaps cheating with another man’s wife. Based on those criteria, would you say then that King David lost his salvation?
  - a. ANSWER: No; in fact, he was one whom God loved very much.
6. Alternatively, perhaps you listed the reason that someone would lose their salvation was behavior that caused another person to stumble. Or perhaps the person did something that was directly counter to God’s will. Then, using these benchmarks, do you consider that Abraham, Moses, Peter and others in the Bible lost their salvation?
  - a. ANSWER: Of course not.
7. Or maybe you listed as an example a believer who lived a life of carnal pleasure and did not do the things that were pleasing to God—even though he or she was a believer. Then do you believe that Lot lost his eternal home? Here was a man who not only loved the carnal life but even offered his daughters to a rioting crowd outside his door who wanted him to throw the angels who had come to warn Lot of the destruction of Sodom and Gomorrah out to them. Did God still love him and save him from that destruction along with his family?
  - a. ANSWER: Of course He did.
8. At the core, when we begin to think that someone can lose their salvation by specific sins that they commit, then we are focusing on works, not grace. We thus believe that our works are what keep us saved, and when those whose works aren’t in fact righteous, then we have lost their eternal hope. This is the wrong focus. What does Ephesians 2:8 tell us about this type of thinking?
  - a. ANSWER: We are saved by God’s grace, and not by our works.

The Security of the Believer  
"For God's gifts and his call are irrevocable."  
Romans 11:29

Judy, this is in response to your question “Is there security for the believer, or can we lose our salvation?” I thought I would prepare an answer in this format so that you or others who may ask later may have this as a reference when confronted with this question by someone else.

There is no way in a few short passages I could ever hope to fully address this doctrinal issue, especially since so many excellent books already exist on the subject. And so what follows below is a summary at best of my limited knowledge on the subject. I rely fully on the inerrant and inspired Word of God whenever I look for answers to any doctrinal issue and on this one in particular I am including all my biblical references (taken from the NIV, the underlining is my way of emphasizing some aspect of a specific scripture).

In short, however, ***THERE IS NO WAY ANY BORN AGAIN BELIEVER IN CHRIST COULD EVER LOSE THEIR SALVATION.*** The fact that Christ redeemed us provides us with that assurance, for if someone or something could take away our salvation they would have to be mightier and greater than God Himself, and clearly no such being exists. However, for the uncertain readers of this paper who want solid biblical evidence I provide the following information.

Before I begin with the numerous references to scripture on this matter I would like to point out a few quick details I about the question itself – “can I lose my salvation?” It has been my observation that when this question is asked it normally has one of two root causes. Either the person is asking the question because they doubt their own salvation experience, and thus fear they might lose it, or they have seen a “Christian” do some horrible thing and cannot believe that that person will get into heaven. Rarely have I heard someone ask the question because of some deep theological need to discover truth.

I say this because knowing why the person is asking the question will also tell you how they will receive the answer, and what answer they need. If, for example, the question is raised because someone doubts their own salvation experience, then read 1 John 5:13 – “I write these things to you who believe in the name of the Son of God so that you may know that you have eternal life” and John 3:16 – “For God so loved the world that He gave His one and only son that whosoever believes in him shall not perish but have eternal life.”

The second type of person, the one who appears to have a born again experience and then goes on to great sin, does not mean that that person has lost his or her salvation. God's grace is too great for that to occur. There are many examples within the Bible that illustrate this, such as the story of David who committed murder and others like him. But the best example would be Lot and not only the life that he led, but the place in which he purposely chose to live that life. He even offered his daughters to a rioting homosexual crowd at his door the night before Sodom was destroyed and yet we know that God found him righteous and saved him from that judgment.

While I recognize it is perplexing for Christians to see someone who blatantly goes against the will of God and sin this does not in and of itself mean that someone has lost their salvation, yes they may have lost rewards and yes they are clearly out of God's will but this does not indicate that God will go against his word, his promise given in John 3:16 – if a person thinks so, then they are focusing on works and not on grace. “For by Grace are you saved” we are told by God, and "not of works" typically when the loss of salvation question arises its because we observed someone doing "bad" works. I think we should leave that person's salvation between him or her and God and focus on our own redemption.

The bottom line is that our salvation is not based on us, on what we do, but our salvation is based on God, his great love for us and the sacrifice of his son for us. Your salvation is assured through Christ and through God's grace – not by anything you do or do not do (works). If, as stated in John 3:16, you believe on the name of Jesus, then you are saved – period – for an eternity.

The remaining scripture references are provided to give you an indication that from the Old Testament through the New Testament there is no question that our faith in Christ is justified and in no sense, no way, or in no fashion can we ever lose that blessed hope.

“If the LORD delights in a man's way, he makes his steps firm; though he stumbles, he will not fall, for the LORD upholds him with his hand.” Psalm 37:23

“The LORD will fulfill his purpose for me; your love, O LORD, endures forever – do not abandon the works of your hands.” Psalm 138:8

“I will make an everlasting covenant with them: I will never stop doing good to them, and I will inspire them to fear me, so that they will never turn away from me.” Jeremiah 32:40

“I tell you the truth, whoever hears my word and believes him who sent me has eternal life and will not be condemned; he has crossed over from death to life.” John 5:24

“All that the Father gives me will come to me, and whoever comes to me I will never drive away.” John 6:37

“And this is the will of him who sent me, that I shall lose none of all that he has given me, but rather raise them up at the last day. For my Father’s will is that everyone who looks to the Son and believes in him shall have eternal life, and I will raise him up at the last day.” John 6:39-40

“Simon Peter answered him, ‘Lord, to who shall we go? You have the words of eternal life. We believe and know that you are the Holy One of God.’” John 6:68-69

“My sheep listen to my voice; I know them, and they follow me. I give them eternal life, and they shall never perish; no one can snatch them out of my hand. My Father, who has given them to me, is greater than all; no one can snatch them out of my Father’s hand. I and the Father are one.” John 10:27-30.

"No, the Father himself loves you because you have loved me and have believed that I came from God." John 16:27

I hope this preliminary review of the scriptures will help in your understanding. Clearly God does not call us to be saved only to give up on us later on. Also note where it says that God saved us from before the foundations of the world – he knew before we were born who we would be and how we will turn out – so there is nothing you can do that is a surprise to Him, therefore if he saved you knowing all about your past, present and future, how could you possibly do anything which would result in losing your salvation?

That would be like saying that you could do something that would cause God to change His mind about having saved you. This of course is simply foolishness. We can and should trust in the Lord and be assured that our salvation is real and is eternal – nothing, no power, no person, no act, no situation can take you from the Lord. Your name has been written in the Lamb's book of life, and we'll live and rule with Christ our redeemer – no question, no doubt, no shadow of turning – saved and saved forever! Hope this has been some help. If you still have questions don't hesitate to ask.
